MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION & ANALYSIS

This management discussion and analysis (“MD&A”) should be read in conjunction with the unaudited interim condensed consolidated financial statements and related notes thereto for the period ended April 30, 2021. These interim condensed consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (“IFRS”) as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (“IASB”) and in accordance with International Accounting Standards (“IAS”) 34, Interim Financial Reporting.

The reader should also refer to the audited consolidated financial statements and related notes thereof for the year ended July 31, 2020 (“Financial Statement”), which have been prepared in accordance with IFRS.

All amounts in the financial statements and this discussion and analysis are expressed in Canadian dollars, unless otherwise indicated.

Overview

We are a mineral exploration company engaged in the acquisition, exploration and development of exploration and evaluation assets (primarily base and precious metals). We do not have any producing exploration and evaluation assets at this time. Our business is presently focused on the exploration and evaluation of various mineral deposits in the Province of British Columbia, Canada.

We are a reporting issuer in each of the Provinces of British Columbia and Alberta. Our head and principal office is located at Suite 580 – 510 Hornby Street Vancouver, British Columbia, V6C 3B6. Our registered and records office is located at Suite 510 – 580 Hornby Street, Vancouver, BC, V6E 3B6.

On August 25, 2017, the Company changed its name to “Canada One Mining Corp.” Effective at the open of markets on August 30, 2017, trading commenced on the TSX Venture Exchange (“TSX-V”) under the new name and ticker symbol “CONE”.

In March 2020, the World Health Organization declared coronavirus COVID-19 a global pandemic. This contagious disease outbreak, which has continued to spread, and any related adverse public health developments, has adversely affected workforces, economies, and financial markets globally, potentially leading to an economic downturn. It is not possible for the Company to predict the duration or magnitude of the adverse results of the outbreak and its effects on the Company’s business or ability to raise funds.

Exploration and Evaluation Assets

British Columbia

Zeus

The Company has a 100% interest in the Zeus claims located in Lillooet, British Columbia. The claims are subject to a 2% NSR, which may be purchased for \$500,000 per 1% NSR.

Princeton Cooper Project

The claims are 100% owned by Canada One Mining. Past exploration has been concentrated in and around the Combination Zone, porphyry Copper occurrence, located just south of the Copper Mountain copper-gold mine. The property covers 2258.0827 hectares in 30 claims.

Since 2009, the following has been completed at the Princeton Copper Project; 25 km 3D IP and ground magnetic surveys, established baseline and completed road improvements, completed soil sampling program, and several drill programs that have returned anomalous copper values up to 0.5% copper.

On March 2, 2021, the Company signed a letter of intent to review the Princeton Copper Project located in British Columbia, Canada and held by Princeton Copper Corp. ("PCC"), a related party private company.

Under the LOI, the Company intends to conduct a due diligence review of the Project in consideration of a potential acquisition. At this time, no terms have been agreed to by the parties and completion of any transaction with PCC is subject to satisfactory due diligence and any required regulatory and third-party approvals.

Results of Operations for the period ended April 30, 2021 and 2020

Overview

For the period ended April 30, 2021, the Company incurred a net loss and comprehensive loss of \$204,827 (2020 - \$170,550). The Company expects to continue to incur losses for fiscal 2020 as exploration and evaluation assets are developed.

Expenses

Loss and comprehensive loss for the nine months ended April 30, 2021 totalled \$204,827 (2020 - \$170,550). Details of significant fluctuations in loss before income taxes are as follows:

- Consulting fees of \$90,000 (2020 - \$Nil). Consulting fees increased due to increased overall company activity in the current period.
- Interest expense of \$13,203 (2020 - \$1,194) due to interest accrued on loan and accounts payable in the current period.
- Management fees of \$49,500 (2020 - \$117,000). Management fees decreased due to decreased management fees to the CEO in the current period.
- Marketing of \$6,000 (2020 - \$Nil). Marketing increased due to higher marketing costs during current period.
- Professional fees of \$26,369 (2020 - \$21,714). Professional fees increased due to increased legal services rendered in the current period.
- Regulatory fees of \$5,101 (2020 - \$7,686). Regulatory fees decreased due to lower share activities during current period.

Loss and comprehensive loss for the three months ended April 30, 2021 totalled \$53,195 (2020 - \$48,290). Details of significant fluctuations in loss before income taxes are as follows:

- Consulting fees of \$29,500 (2020 - \$Nil). Consulting fees increased due to increased overall company activity in the current period.
- Management fees of \$16,500 (2020 - \$39,000). Management fees decreased due to decreased management fees to the CEO in the current period.
- Office and general recovery of \$506 (2020 – expense of \$7,654). Office and general increased due to recovery of office and general expenses paid in prior period.
- Professional fees of \$6,380 (2020 – recovery of \$3,375). Professional fees increased due to increased legal services rendered in the current period.
- Regulatory fees of \$933 (2020 - \$6,330). Regulatory fees decreased due to lower share activities during current period.

Long-term profitability will be directly related to the success of our exploration and evaluation asset acquisition and exploration activities. Management will pursue additional financing to fund exploration and evaluation assets acquisition and exploration activities, and/or enter into joint venture agreements with third parties, as we do not generate any revenue from operations.

Management believes that the current cash and working capital position will sustain reduced operations. However, there can be no assurance that financing will be available to us in the amount required or, if available, that it can be obtained on terms satisfactory to us. These uncertainties cast significant doubt upon the Company's ability to continue as a going concern.

The Company does not have any long-term debt obligations.

Transactions with Related Parties

Key management compensation includes all fees paid or accrued to officers and/or directors described in this note. Except as disclosed elsewhere in these financial statements, related party transactions incurred during the period ended April 30, 2021 were as follows:

Management fees totaling \$22,500 (2020 – \$90,000), and office and general expenses of \$22,500 (2020 - \$22,500) were accrued to a company owned by the CEO, who is also a director of the Company. As of April 30, 2021, the balance owing to the CEO was \$316,497 (July 31, 2020 – \$278,037).

Management fees totaling \$27,000 (2020 - \$27,000) were accrued to a company owned by the CFO, who is also a director of the Company. As of April 30, 2021, the balance owing to the CFO was \$131,400 (July 31, 2020 - \$112,500).

During the period ended April 30, 2021, the Company received advances of \$22,500 (July 31, 2020 – \$2,260) from a company owned by the CEO of which \$15,960 was repaid in the period. As of April 30, 2021, the advances balance owing to the company owned by the CEO was \$11,871 (July 31, 2020 –

\$12,331) and is included in due to related parties.

During the period ended April 30, 2021, the Company received advances of \$5,000 (July 31, 2020 – \$10,000) from the CFO. As of April 30, 2021, the loan outstanding owing to the CFO was \$15,000 (July 31, 2020 – \$10,000) and is included in due to related parties.

As at April 30, 2021, total amounts due to related parties was \$466,268 (July 31, 2020 – \$402,868). Amounts due to related parties are unsecured, non-interest bearing and are due on demand.

During the period ended April 30, 2021, the Company issued Nil (July 31, 2020 – 1,250,000) stock options to the directors of the Company with a fair value of \$Nil (July 31, 2020 - \$48,230).

Share Capital

Authorized share capital consists of an unlimited number of common shares without par value.

As at June 23, 2021, the Company had 22,613,456 common shares outstanding.

Risks and Uncertainties

The carrying values of the Company's cash, reclamation bonds, accounts payable and accrued liabilities, loans payable and advances from related parties approximate their value due to their short-term nature.

The Company's risk exposure and the impact on the Company's financial instruments are summarized below.

Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk of potential loss to the Company if the counterparty to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations.

The Company's credit risk is primarily attributable to its holdings of cash and reclamation deposits. The carrying amounts of these financial assets represent the maximum credit exposure. The Company manages credit risk by placing its cash with major financial institutions in conservative cash-based liquid

investments. Reclamation bonds are held with state or provincial government authorities. The Company monitors its exposure to credit risk on an ongoing basis.

Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will be unable to meet its financial obligations as they become due. The Company's approach to managing liquidity risk is forecasting cash flows from operations and anticipating investing and financing activities.

Accounts payable have maturities of 90 days or less and are subject to normal trade terms. Advances from related party are due on demand.

Market Risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in market prices. The risks to which the Company is exposed are:

i) Interest rate risk

The Company is not exposed to significant interest rate risk.

ii) Foreign currency risk

The Company's functional currency is the Canadian dollar. Consequently, fluctuations of the Canadian dollar in relation to other currencies impact the fair value of financial assets and liabilities and operating results. The Company does not manage currency risks through hedging or other currency management tools.

As at April 30, 2021, the Company did not have any significant financial instruments subject to currency risk denominated in United States.

iii) Other price risk

Other price risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in market prices, other than those arising from interest rate risk. The Company is not exposed to significant other price risk.

Our principal activity is mineral exploration and development. Companies in this industry are subject to many and varied kinds of risks, but not limited to, environmental, metal prices, political and economical. Although we have taken steps to verify the title to exploration and evaluation assets in which we have an interest, in accordance with industry standards for the current stage of exploration of such properties, these procedures do not guarantee title. Property titles may be subject to unregistered prior agreements or transfers and title may be affected by undetected defects.

We have no significant sources of operating cash flow and no revenue from operations. Additional capital will be required to fund our exploration program. The sources of funds available to us are the sale of marketable securities, sale of equity capital or the offering of an interest in its project to another party. There is no assurance that we will be able to obtain adequate financing in the future or that such financing will be advantageous to us.

The property interests owned by us or in which we have an option to earn an interest are in the

exploration stages only, are without known bodies of commercial mineralization and have no ongoing mining operations. Mineral exploration involves a high degree of risk and few properties, which are explored, are ultimately developed into producing mines. Exploration of our mineral exploration may not result in any discoveries of commercial bodies of mineralization. If our efforts do not result in any discovery of commercial mineralization, we will be forced to look for other exploration projects or cease operations.

We are subject to the laws and regulations relating to environmental matters in all jurisdictions in which we operate, including provisions relating to property reclamation, discharge of hazardous materials and other matters. We may also be held liable should environmental problems be discovered that were caused by former owners and operators of our properties in which we previously had no interest. We conduct its mineral exploration activities in compliance with applicable environmental protection legislation. We are not aware of any existing environmental problems related to any of our current or former properties that may result in material liabilities to us.

Financial Instruments

The Company prepares its condensed interim consolidated financial statements in conformity with IFRS. The Company lists its significant accounting policies and its financial instruments in Notes 2 and 3, respectively, to its condensed interim consolidated financial statements for the period ended April 30, 2021.

Dependence on Management

We are dependent on a relatively small number of key personnel, the loss of any of whom could have an adverse effect on our business. We do not maintain key employee insurance on any of our employees.

Off-Balance Sheet Arrangements

We did not enter into any off-balance sheet transactions or commitments as defined by NI 51 –102.
